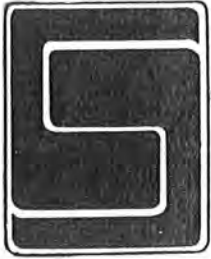

With the above in mind — and the fact that our ranks are being slowly depleted by the hands of time — It is desired by many of us (now-a-days) old timers we:

Formulate a Sons and Daughters membership of "The Fighting 69th."

It is thought that this will perpetuate the loyalty, and Americanism of ourselves, and our descendants, also CONTINUE OUR SCHOLARSHIP FUND FOREVER.

SCHOLARSHIP AWARD APPLICATIONS WANTED

The Scholarship Committee is anxiously awaiting assemblage and review of this year's applications. If there is anything we like better than collecting scholarship funds, it's giving them away. So, 69ers — if you have a worthy son or daughter planning to attend college shortly, make a point of it to see that he or she applies for the 69th Inf. Div. Assoc. Scholarship Award — as soon as possible.

Each year the Association presents a \$500. award, paid in four annual installments of \$125., to a child of a former member of the Fighting 69th Inf. Div. For the child eligible, the 69er must have paid his dues for at least two of the last 3 years, so 69ers — make sure your dues are up to date, and pay up your back dues if you're delinquent. Since the award is open only to children of 69ers, the number of applicants is relatively small and the potential for winning is very good.

The award is made primarily on the basis of scholastic ability. All applications are forwarded to our consultant and adviser, Miss Mary Drew, who is associated with the Educational Testing Service at Princeton, N.J. Miss Drew performs a professional evaluation of all applications submitted and presents her recommendations to our Scholarship Committee. Based on Miss Drew's professional analysis the committee then makes the ultimate selection of the award winner or winners. The Scholarship Committee is composed of the past presidents of the Association together with the current president and treasurer.

Announcement of the award and presentation of the initial \$125. payment generally takes place at the annual Reunion. Subsequent payments are made annually as long as the recipient maintains satisfactory college grades.
