T.D's.



SEND IN YOUR DUES TODAY

WHAT MAKES A BUDDIE FEEL GOOD

After years of sending out news of Co. G, 271 both in the national publication and a Co. G newsletter, your editor received a first word from a former buddie who left us before combat. It is the kind of letter that warms the heart from a fellow member of your company when he mentions so many names that are familiar. Have you ever thought of the men you served with and have you wondered where they were? The way to get interested is send in a letter to your editor or write someone else in your outfit and ask him if he knows. We can be your vehicle in finding some of them. You can write him at his last address or write the chamber of commerce or the chief of police. Even the P.O. will help SOMETIMES. You will be surprised to learn that a long distance call for that area code will locate them. Even if they have moved. Here is the letter I received :

"Dear Loar: Many thanks for the work you have been doing with reference to the 69th Div. Assoc. and particularly the newsletter concerning Co. G, 271.

I was a member of Co. G from early Jan. '44 until Christmas of 1944 when some of us were awakened and told that we would be leaving Co. G and would be sent over to Belgium as replacements. I was one of the buck sergeants in Sgt. Aichele's platoon. I can certainly recall the frustration, disappointments, and even the many tears that were shed as we left. I have said many times since that I saw some of what I have always thought to be the "toughest" men I had ever known shed many tears as we left. As you know so well, we had worked and trained together and had developed a genuine fondness for each other only to end up being separated at the last minute. I joined Co. G in Jan. '44 as a corporal after having failed to make the grade in Inf. School at Ft. Benning. I have felt many times since that must have been a blessing in disguise. I was Dave Scatena's Assistant Squad Leader. Even though I have not seen Dave since 1944 we still send each other Christmas cards each year. I flew over to Pittsburg recently in a private plane and wondered just where Oakmont, Pa. and Dave Scatena were!

After leaving Co. G in December '44 I believe most of us were assigned to the 83rd Division. I joined the 83rd in Belgium and on Jan. 17, '45 received a shrapnel wound serious enough to send me back to England and then to the USA. I completely recovered except for the loss of ten teeth and was discharged Apr. 15, '46.

I have maintained contact with a few of the men I was with at Cp. Shelby—Dave Scatena, Ed Bayus and Wm. McCague. I have their addresses. I lost contact with John McLean about two yrs. ago. I also corresponded with Pete Wickliffe for many years but have not heard from him in about five years. Your newsletters have brought several names to mind. I have heard of some of the Co. G men who were KIA and was sorry to learn this sad news. I have wondered about John Aichele, Sgt. Plugge, Sgt. Nelson and many others. I recall Sgt. Lingenfelter, Draa, Pounders, and Shorty Reynolds. I hadn't thought of him in years until I read one of the bulletins and then I recalled that Shorty could make more noise in the mornings when he woke us up than any little fellow I had ever known. I recall Maneuvers

shortly after I joined Co. G in the Desoto National Forest where there was an abundance of "fat lightwood" that we could burn when the situation was not too "tactical." I also remember Fred Hanf (?) and Hooper, Lt. Roman, Capt. Doan, Curtis and McCoppen. McCoppen's sense of responsibility he felt in getting us ready for combat and how he seemed to have a very high regard for most of his men. And I recall Fred Curran, Chris Rasmussen, Hans Beets and Sgt. Carpenter. I'm sure that if I could attend a reunion many more names would come to mind. I would also like to know the location of Chas. Smith who was with us at Shelby. I saw him briefly in Atlanta before I was discharged.

Since my discharge in '46 I have been in Hartsville, S.C., employed by a large seed Co. We are engaged in plant breeding and seed sales for most of the Southern field crops—cotton, tobacco, hybrid corn, soybeans, wheat and oats. I have for the past ten years served as General Farm Manager for Coker's Pedigreed Seed Co. We are presently farming 3500 acres. Am enclosing a check for \$10 for dues. DAVID L. We could print ten thousand bulletins describing what goes on when men who have not seen each other for years suddenly meet up in the labby and shake hands... and grab each other, yes and a few tears... You know some of the wives know a great deal about our times in the service, and they are great at remembering names and places and people that maybe even we have forgotten. This I think is one of the nicest parts of our reunions, and that is one big family. Everyone is so friendly and willing to help.

The ladies auxiliary held their annual meeting with over 125 ladies present . . . They were treated to a floral decorating demonstration. Prizes were given and coffee and pastry was served. 
