Back in 1949 I made a business trip to Washington and stopped at the Pentagon to say hello to General Bolte. And that is the last contact I had. Read in the paper several years ago that Lt Gen. Floyd L. Parks died. Used to sweat out having to ride the rambuctious horse he sometimes road at Shelby, and I always enjoyed eating ice cold watermelon on his porch.

Would love to have any of the boys stop by and see me. Would also like to subscribe to the bulletin. Among others I would like to get addresses of Gen. Bolte, Dr. Hutton former Div. Med. Off., Dr. Braverman, and Dr. Russman. One of the latter two I recall helping a little in obtaining a little dental equipment for their future offices. All legal of course.

I have many fond memories of the 69th Div. and Div. Hq. Co. and a few regrets. I remember well when I got the word of a surprise inspection, and all the guys worked all night long marking equipment and getting their rifles and all the motor pool cars in top shape. We got a superior rating and the G-4 couldn't understand how we had done so well. And when we won the Div. War Bond Sales Contest in '44. Looking back I am chagrined that I pressured the boys too much to buy bonds

considering that a staff Sgt. made only \$76.00 a month. Geez, what pay. And I shall never forget when we were in Germany and had been pinched out of the line temporarily. I found a brewery. So I bought a two and a half ton truck load of beer for the boys. I could not understand German. Wish I had tasted the stuff first. It tasted like hog wash. Terrible, and what a waste of company funds.

You know, looking at the picture of General Bolte on the bulletin cover reminds me of the time at Shelby when Div. Hq. and Hq. Co. were taking a conditioning hike and I guess I was setting too fast a pace. I can still see General Bolte when we had a brief rest, stepping up from the rear and shaking his Gen. Officers riding crop at me.

As you can see I have very fond memories of the 69th and my association with the swell men who served along with me.

Almost thirty years have passed since the end of the war in Europe, a signal for redeployment of troops and personnel. Many of our men were shipped home immediately, and quite a few were sent to different outfits to await their call because of their shortage of points. In the process many friendships were broken... people who had literally lived together for a long period of time were separated. At the time we felt that we would never forget our "buddie"; but time takes its toll and addresses exchanged were lost, people moved or were relocated by their company, and slowly but surely contact was severed.

What makes the 69th Infantry Division so unique, is that since the very beginning of the association when General Reinhardt, Col. Ed Leary and several others who were interested in keeping alive the spirit of the division and those great units who supported us, made an effort which continues to this day through the outstanding work of Clarence Marshall, to make every effort to relocate, and unite once again the men who served in or with from May 15, 1943—August 18, 1945. With over 4400 names on our roster, I would say we have been rather successful; but there are so many more out there for us to make contact with. This is our appeal to you. 
