GENERAL BRADLEY'S ADDRESS AT EHRENBREITSTEIN

It is of interest to note that the 8th Infantry garrisoned Ehrenbreitstein during the Occupation after the last war and lowered the colors on 23 January 1923 prior to their departure. To commemorate this fact, the 8th Infantry is represented in the ceremony by two rifle platoons and by delivering the Colors to be raised today. The 69th Infantry Division captured Ehrenbreitstein recently. It is likewise represented by two rifle platoons and will, after receiving them from the 8th Infantry, raise the Colors. Each Division in the 12th Army group is represented by one enlisted man especially selected for this occasion.

The same American flag that flew over Fort Ehrenbreitstein during the occupation period following the end of World War I will be unfurled again at the fort on Army Day, April 6, symbolizing the victorious return of American troops to Germany for the second time in a generation.

Each infantry and armored division under command of General Omar N. Bradley's Twelfth Army Group will be represented at the ceremony by a combat soldier who has served with distinction in the war against German militarism,

The flag raising ceremony will be conducted by one doughboy each from D. and M. Companies of the 8th Infantry Regiment of the Fourth Infantry Division and one soldier from the 69th Division's 272nd Infantry Combat Team which captured the fort on March 27. D. and M. Companies of the 8th garrisoned the fort from the end of World War I until 1923.

The garrison flag, which was run down on January 23, 1923, was replaced by a French tricolor as American participation in the occupation ended. It was returned to the United States where it hung in a case on the wall of the Secretary of War's Office opposite the flag which was lowered at Fort Sumter, South Carolina, after the War Between the States. It was flown from Washington to Germany for the Army Day ceremony.



FIGHTING 69th INFANTRY DIVISION ASSOCIATION

FOR RELEASE AT WILL

The fighting 69th Infantry Division Association has announced that its 30th annual reunion will be held this year on Aug. 14-21 at Mountain Shadows, the Del Webb resort hotel at Scottsdale, Arizona.

According to Stanley Olszewski of New Britain, Conn., national president of the association, this will be the first reunion of the Fighting 69th ever held west of the Mississippi.

The organization is made up of World War II veterans all over the country who served in the 69th Infantry Division or its attached outfits, the 661st Tank Destroyer Battalion and the 777th Tank Battallion. Activated at Camp Shelby, Miss., in 1943, the 69th distinguished itself overseas in spearheading the First Army drive across Germany from the Rhine to the Elbe.

Chairman in charge of this year's reunion is Col. Robert Meyers, USA Ret., of Sun City, Ariz., who has prepared a schedule of events that include business and social meetings of the association and its board of directors and ladies auxiliary, tours to scenic attractions, a Saturday night (Aug. 20) banquet and dance, and a memorial ceremony traditionally honoring departed comrades.

Individual unit dinners and get-togethers in specially reserved hospitality rooms will be sponsored by the 269th Engineers, the 661st T. D's., and various other units.

Colonel Meyers has also announced that the association's Scholarship Committee will award one or more scholarships at this reunion. This is an annual award of \$500 or more to a deserving son or daughter of a member of the Fighting 69th.

Among former officers of the division who will attend the reunion is Gen. Charles Bolte, USA Ret., of Washington, D.C., who organized and activated the division in 1943. Col. Donald B. Miller of Prescott, Ariz., wartime commander of the 661st Tank Destroyer Battalion, will also be present.

Another reunion visitor will be Dr. William Robertson, a Los Angeles neuro-surgeon, who was in charge of the patrol that made first contact with the Russian troops in the historic U.S.-Soviet link-up at Torgau, Germany, in April 1945. Dr. Robertson visited Russia in 1975 with an official U.S. State Department delegation, and will report on this experience at the forthcoming reunion.

Several hundred persons annually attend the Fighting 69th reunions, but President Stan Olszewski is confident of an exceptional turnout this year.

"We're looking for many newcomers from the West and Midwest." he said, "as well as the regulars on the East Coast who usually attend."

He has emphasized that all veterans of the 69th Infantry or its supporting units, the 661st T.D's. and 777th Tank Battalion, will be welcomed at any or all sessions of the reunion. Anyone desiring further information should write to Clarence Marshall, 101 Stephen Street, New Kensington, PA 15068.

RETIRED GENERAL OF MICHIGAN GUARD SUCCUMBS

Services will be at 11 a.m. Wednesday at St. Michael Catholic Church for Cecil J. Kennedy, retired Michigan National Guard major general, who died Saturday.

A veteran of two World Wars, Gen. Kennedy, 77, commanded the guard's 46th Division from November, 1959, to February, 1962, when he retired.

A native of Alpena, he was a graduate of Dort High School here and General Motors Institute. For many years he owned and operated a food market at 1201 N. Saginaw.

He enlisted in the Army as a private in March, 1918, and served in France with a transportation unit. He was discharged in 1919 and in 1921 enlisted in the National Guard in Flint. Six years later he became a commissioned officer.

In 1940 he went into federal service with the 125th Infantry Regiment. He was promoted to captain in 1941 and major in 1942,

His World War II service moved him to the rank of lieutenant colonel and he served in Europe as a battalion commander and regimental executive officer.

For his service in World War II he was awarded the Bronze Star, with Oak Leaf cluster, American Defense Service Medal, European-African-Middle Eastern Campaign Medal with two battle stars, and the Victory Medal.

Gen. Kennedy became executive officer of the National Guard's reorganized 125th Regiment in 1946 and its commander in 1951.

When he was named assistant commander of the 46th Division in 1954, he was promoted to brigadier general. He received a second star and the rank of major general when he took over command of the division.

He leaves his wife, Agnes, M.; son, John B., of Davison, and three sisters, Mrs. Phelina Plourde, Flint, Mrs. Eva Damico, Ferndale, and Mrs. Irene Brennan, Detroit.

Gen. Kennedy formerly resided at 2224 Mackin, but at the time of death he lived at 346 South, Davison.
