

I guess I'd have to say that I was involved in the beginning of the 69th. In May 1943, I was assigned to Co.-I, 273rd Infantry, 1st Squad, 3rd Platoon. Captain Bearden was Company Commander and Lieutenant Ryan was Platoon Leader. Basic training, maneuvers and reassignment was completed at Camp Shelby.

At that point and time, I was informed that most likely I would be sent to Engineering School at the University of Alabama; however, I made an attempt to transfer to a Paratroop Training Unit instead. Before either of these two took place, I was on shipping orders up to Ft. Meade, Maryland, and subsequently shipped to the ETO on the Queen Elizabeth, as a Salt Water Corporal.

Arrived in England in 1943, went over to France in mid-1944, and on up through Germany. Returned to the United States in December 1945, and discharged.

I can't say that I have been in touch with many, or any of the originals in Co.-I, 273rd Infantry, but I'd sure like to know their names and addresses if possible.

I am enclosing ten dollars as a Contribution Membership in the Association, which if I read correctly, includes my wife, Lenore.

Briefing From Our President

Hello, Again:

Since our Reunion in Boston, we have been busy. As a result I feel responsible to let each of you know what is going on, as it affects you and our Association.

October 25-28, 1979, I went to the Marriott Hotel in New Orleans, Lousiana, to work out all details to ensure that this coming Reunion will be an outstanding one. I was joined by **Frank See, Cliff Blank, John Gradomski, Warren Alford**. Merle **Douglas** and **Martha Douglas**. We worked hard and have completed all details and advance planning required to ensure a great Reunion, as you will see outlined elsewhere in this Bulletin. In New Orleans it is not cheap, and we fought hard to hold down your cost. As a result, it looks as though your cost will be about \$110 (per couple) above the costs in Boston and Pittsburgh. We have 4 days of scheduled activities, starting with '**Our Return to Camp Shelby' on Wednesday, August 20th**. The Early Bird Boat Ride (includes food and music), and our one big meal at **The Banquet** actually costs \$19.91. I sincerely hope, in this age of inflation, these costs will not alter a record attendance.

In early October, I received a Staff Study proposal from HQ, 7th Army in Europe which proposed reactivation of the Fighting 69th Infantry Division for assignment to the Berlin Brigade. I immediately dispatched all details to General Bolte, all Officers, all Board Members, and all Past Presidents. By late October, I had heard from about 28 of 38 of these people. They favored the action. At General Bolte's request, I wrote personal letters to the Vice Chief of Staff, GG Berlin Brigade and the USA Brigadier General in charge of Army Historical Section. As of now, we have done all they asked of us. In the words of General Bolte, "It will involve a lot of maneuvering for this to happen, and we can only wait." He is continuing to work on it and is strongly for it.

With publication of our Constitution and By-Laws, I have appointed a Resolutions Committee to study this document and submit proposed recommendations to up-date in time to publish in the May Bulletin. This will allow us to ask for an informed vote in New Orleans, from all of you. Chairman of the Committee is Chuck Herring, 214 N. 22nd Street, Wilmington, N.C. 28405 – Phone 919/763-3198. Other members are: Pat Lushbaugh, Bill Beswick, Davisson Dunlap [Attorney] and John Suprano. You are invited to write Chuck Herring with any thoughts you have in this matter.

It will be a great help to the New Orleans Reunion Committee, if your reservations to attend are made early — not later than mid-July 1980. This cooperation, on your part, will enable the committee to accomplish many things which will make your Reunion more enjoyable. Some of these include:

- a] Advance typing of registrations forms.
- **b**] Unit seating at the Beer Party and Banquet.
- **c**] Unit floor assignments in the hotel.
- d] Pre-printing of name tags.
- e] Review Reunion costs to our members. A large attendance can allow them to make some reduction in the published individual costs at the Reunion.

All cost details related to this Reunion and complimentary room assignments will be published in the Registration Room.

A Beautiful Letter

Dear Earl:

I promised our President Bob Myers, that I would write to you regarding our 69th Recon Troop.

I was sent to Camp Shelby, Miss., on May 12, 1943, and I was present when General Bolte greeted us and activated the 69th Division. I was assigned to the 69th Recon Troop and remained with the Division all the way to meet the Russians at Torgau on the Elbe River. Prior to the Division returning state-side. I was reassigned and I remained with the Army of Occupation until I was discharged in April 1946.

Remaining in Germany allowed me to leisurely do some sightseeing. I also went to Italy and visited the birthplace of my parents and made acquaintances with many cousins. My wife, Mary; and my son, Mickey, and I returned to Europe in 1968, to revisit some of the areas we had covered during the war. I also visited a German family I met after the War and rekindled an old friendship. In fact, we still correspond with one another and exchange gifts. I also returned to Italy to locate an Italian Prisoner of War we liberated. John is living near Venice and we spent an enjoyable four days together, talking of the War years and also sightseeing the countryside. John promised to visit me, but so far he has not been able to make the trip.

Every year since the late 1940's, several of our Recon Troopers started a Mini Reunion and each year another name or two was added to the list, and each year one or two more Troopers would attend. I started attending these Reunions around 1952 or 1953. We have met in Columbus, Dayton, and Cincinnati, Ohio; Pittsburgh, Everett, York, Valley Forge, and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania; Atlantic City and Asbury Park, New Jersey; New York City; Richmond, Virginia; Washington, D.C.; and Silver Springs, Maryland. The Reunions have been held in several cities more than once. It will return to Richmond, Virginia, in 1980. I have committed myself to our National President, Bob Myers, that I will do my best to have



Wednesday, August 20th, 1980, will see interested members of the 69th Infantry Division depart New Orleans on chartered bus at 9:00 A.M., for the first group return to Camp Shelby, Mississippi, since the Division left for overseas in November of 1944.

In the 36 intervening years, Camp Shelby was closed at the end of World War II, after being used as a Demobilization Base, was developed as an Emergency Railhead Facility during the Korean War, and was reopened in 1954, as an Annual Field Training site for National Guard Units. In 1958, with the first of over eight million dollars in Federal Funds, a schedule of construction was begun, and since that time, 278 Barracks, 74 Mess Halls, 99 Company Administration and Supply Buildings, 16 Battalion Supply Buildings, 22 Batallion Headquarters, 5 Brigade Headquarters, 1 Division Headquarters, 1 Post Hospital, 1 Brigade Dispensary, and 5 Ammunition Supply Igloos have been completed.

Proceeds from the sale of timber and forest products from the complete Military Reservation, of more than 136,000 acres of land, have been used to construct a Chapel, 2 Post Exchanges, 2 Service Clubs, a Theater, a Swimming Pool, and a Field Pavilion for Troop recreation.

The busses will go directly to Camp Headquarters, where a briefing on the present status of the camp will be presented by Colonel Theodore E. Stuart, Training Camp Supervisor, Mississippi National Guard, and his staff will conduct tours for visits to original training areas.

Lunch will be served at the William Carey College Cafeteria in Hattiesburg, where the Veterans will be welcomed by Mississippi Governor William Winter, Hattiesburg Mayor W. L "Bud" Gerrard, and other local citizens. The Hattiesburg Area Historical Society will provide automobiles and guides for members to re-visit special areas of interest. After a general bus tour of the area, the goup will depart to arrive in New Orleans at 5:30 P.M.

The total cost of the outing will be \$16.00 per person, which includes transportation, and luncheon. Informal cool clothing, sun hats, and short sleeves will be the 'uniform of the day'. M. E. Douglas, 369th Medical Battalion, P.O. Box 308, Hattiesburg, Miss. 39401, is in charge of local arrangement and will appreciate recommendations or special requests.


